CONTEXT

The Shrine of Remembrance (Shrine) is Victoria's principal war memorial, founded in 1927 and dedicated in 1934 to commemorate the 114,000 men and women of Victoria who served, and the 19,000 who gave their lives, in the First World War.

The Shrine is one of Melbourne's most iconic landmarks, set in a prominent location on a 13-hectare reserve at the southern end of Melbourne's cultural arts precinct. The Shrine Reserve includes major monuments to the Second World War and Post 1945 conflicts, and more than 320 memorial plaques dedicated to designated defence force units.

The Shrine was augmented in 2003 through addition of a Visitor Centre on its northern side providing access to the monument for people with disabilities and space for education and public amenities. In 2005, the Shrine's education and learning facilities were extended through the construction of an Education Centre in the undercroft to the monument.

This work was enhanced in 2014 through development of the Galleries of Remembrance: a museum space beneath the monument providing interpretation of Victorian service and sacrifice from pre-Federation to present times. The development also established a dedicated education centre inclusive of a 137-seat auditorium.

The Shrine receives more than 500,000 visitors annually participating in its onsite ceremonial, education and learning programs: including 50,000 students. Online engagement exceeds 500,000.

The 2025–30 Strategic Plan was developed by the Shrine's Board of Trustees to provide overarching direction to the management of the Shrine, aligned with pursuit of the 2025–45 Shrine Master Plan.

PURPOSE

To be a memorial to honour the service and sacrifice of Victorians and Australians in war, conflict, peacemaking and peacekeeping and as a site of national, State and cultural significance.



The Shrine's purpose is derived from the Shrine of Remembrance Act 1978 that also establishes the Trustees overarching functions:

- (a) responsibility for the care, management, maintenance and preservation of the Shrine of Remembrance—
 - (i) as a memorial to honour the service and sacrifice of Victorians and Australians in war, conflict, peacekeeping and peacemaking; and
 - (ii) as a site of national, State and cultural significance; and
- (b) the development, promotion, management and the staging of ceremonial activities and events to commemorate the service and sacrifice of Victorians and Australians in war, conflict, peace keeping and peacemaking, including, but not limited to, wreath laying and other ceremonial or commemorative activities; and
- (c) the development, promotion, management and implementation of public programs to inform, educate and promote understanding among Victorians and visitors about the history, experience, service and sacrifice of Victorians and Australians in war, conflict, peacekeeping and peace-making, including, but not limited to, exhibitions, lectures, publications, school learning and outreach programs.


